At meetings we have continued to give time on our agenda after necessary business to share information about events and matters of concern within our individual denominations as well as occasionally reflecting together on issues which affect all our churches.

It was with regret that we accepted the resignation of Margret Sarafian from the Council in March. She has been a cheerful and very willing Correspondence Secretary and we will all miss her smile at meetings. Major Stuart Dicker (Salvation Army) retired from active service at the beginning of June. Stuart has been a very active and valued member over the past nine years and we will miss him greatly. We wish him and his wife, Major Gillian Dicker a long and healthy retirement in England. It was with great sadness that we accepted the resignation of Rev. John Parkin in the Spring. John has been an enthusiastic member and an inspiration in so many ways not least as St. Patrick on many occasions. Rev. Gary McDowell (Presbyterian) also resigned in early 2020. Ayda Lundon (Armenian Apostolic) and Tom Kehoe (Greek Orthodox) were both on leave of absence during the year.

In September we welcomed Tanya Olhausen (Church of Ireland) to the Council and Colm Harte (Religious Society of Friends) in October. In February Yvonne Luven (Greek Orthodox) joined us and in May we were pleased to welcome Rev. Andrew Kingston (Methodist) and Rev. Alan Boal (Presbyterian). Rev. Our refreshed website went live during summer 2019. It has an attractive layout and easy access and it has proved to be of great benefit to the Council in the months since. We are very grateful to Jiby Jacob not only for designing and creating the website but also for maintaining it. The role of Recording Secretary remained unfilled during the year and I am grateful to my husband, Denis, for taking the notes for me at meetings so that I can write the minutes thereafter.

The Council is also grateful for the venues which have been willing to host our meetings during the year, Clonliffe College, St. Finian's Lutheran Church, St. Matthias Church of Ireland, Ballybrack, Holy Trinity Church of Ireland, Rathmines, and Wesley House, Leeson Park While it might be good to have a permanent "home" for our meetings, the diversity of meeting places is a very real reminder that we are a Pilgrim People.

May God continue to bless us as we journey together and bring to fulfilment all that we seek to do together in His name.

KEY ACTIVITIES

Our ninth **FORUM DAY** was held on Thursday, 3rd October, 2019 in Clonliffe College. As we had been considering environmental matters and as the feast day of St. Francis fell on the 4th October, Father Philip Baxter who has a special interest in St. Francis was invited as the keynote speaker. His talk and his topics for discussion afterwards were related to lifestyle, peace, creation and climate.

The annual **WALK OF LIGHT** took place on Sunday, 24th November. The theme chosen was *Walking together for our common home*. Starting with worship at the first Station in St. Finian’s Lutheran Church on Adelaide Road, the ecumenical congregation set out after that to walk along the north side of the canal to La Touche Bridge where the Walkers crossed the canal to reach the second station, the Church of Mary Immaculate Refuge of Sinners on Rathmines Road.



Worship continued here with the singing led by members of the choir and their choirmaster/organist of St. Bartholomew’s Church, Ballsbridge. An inspiring address was given by Jane Mellet of Trocaire, the organization which was the beneficiary of the collections at each of the three stations.

The walk then continued along Rathmines Road, past all the shops to Holy Trinity Church of Ireland where there was a short address and the concluding prayers were said. Holy Trinity Parish provided light refreshments afterwards.

As every year the walk benefitted from the efficient, unobtrusive stewarding of the Gardaí who also held up traffic for us at our crossing points. Members of the St. John’s Ambulance Brigade also accompanied us but thankfully their services were not required this year. As ever our thanks are due to the Gardaí for ensuring our safe passage along the route as well as the stewards who assisted.

THE INAUGURAL SERVICE FOR THE WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY on 19th January, 2020, (instead of 18th) was held in the beautiful surroundings of the Church of the Assumption on Booterstown Avenue. The change of date was because 18th fell on a Saturday and it was felt that we would not get a good attendance as a result.



The material for the 2020 service was created by the Christian Churches in Malta. They chose the theme of *They showed us unusual kindness (Acts 28v.2)*. It was a liturgy with a difference, gradually telling the story of the shipwreck of Paul and his companions and how the islanders rescued and treated them. The Liturgy Group in the Church of the Assumption involved young members to act out the various passages as they were read as well as being stewards at the door to greet people as they arrived.

Parishioners had also taken up the nautical theme of the liturgy when decorating the Parish Centre where refreshments were served afterwards.

THE ST. PATRICK’S DAY SERVICE had been prepared, advertised and was ready to take place when it had to be cancelled because of the spread of Covid-19 and the lockdown restrictions announced by the Taoiseach. We hope we will be able to use the liturgy in 2021, and that most of those who agreed to participate will also be able to take part.
